


OUR PURPOSE

Regardless of your immigration status, you have the right to emergency medical care under the Emergency Medical Treatment and Labor Act (EMTALA). Some health care providers may ask for your immigration status to find out if you qualify for public health insurance, but you cannot be denied treatment based on your immigration status. PERSONAL DRIVER'S LICENSES

A home country license is valid in Ohio as long as it's unexpired and from one of the countries covered by the <u>United Nations Convention on Road Traffic</u>, but usually only for up to your first six months in the U.S. (The idea is that if you're a tourist you can just come here on vacation and drive with your home country license - but most tourists cannot legally stay longer than six months). Whether you will actually get a ticket if you've been driving for years on an expired home-country license is a question of probability.

The Ohio BVM Knowledge Test "is available in the following languages in both text, and audio: Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Haitian Creole, Japanese, Russian, Somali, and Spanish. In text, and video: American Sign Language."

"If testing in another language is needed, you may schedule a proctored test with your interpreter by visiting a driver exam station. Customers must be able to understand directions and read traffic signs printed in English." (www.bmv.ohio.gov)

We recommend going to the <u>Huber BMV location</u> if you need to get your driver's license. In our experience, they have been the most welcoming!

"Every person in the United States is protected by the Fair Housing Act to have to right to live, rent, buy, or obtain a dwelling regardless of his/her protected classes if he or she is able to meet the financial and other eligibility requirements. If a housing-provider refuses to rent or sell to you because of your race, color, national origin, religion, sex (gender), disability, familial status (children in the family), you should contact your local fair housing agency to get help. Fair housing agencies do not require a person's immigration or refugee status when people file fair housing complaints and their services are free."
